# WOMEN ON MISSION

The following is a personal testimony given during a morning worship service in the spring, 1971 at Oakhill Baptist Church by Mrs. Wanda Schultz .....

“The building was small but new, it had a good location and I noticed they had taken the trouble to place a few nice shrubs in the front. When I walked in I had heard so much about this great pastor and this marvelous church. My first thoughts were: I had seen finer churches and had heard far greater speakers. When I sat down my feet got cold on the concrete floor that wasn’t covered and my back got tired sitting in a non-cushioned pew. I wondered, by what standard had they judged this speaker and building.

I started attending this little church. For you see, it ceased to be a building. I found that for me the church was bigger than I had at first noticed. This church reached far beyond the four walls and I found myself listening to every word the pastor spoke from the pulpit because I found sincerity, Christian love and a real joy coming from his heart. My feet no longer got cold because the love I had felt from the top of my head to the tip of my toe overwhelmed me. The hardness of the pews had been softened by the peace and comfort I had found when Jesus sat down with me because He was a permanent resident in my heart.

I entered a building  
and found a church  
I sat in a seat  
and found a place  
I shook a hand  
and felt warmth  
I looked into a face that smiled  
and saw God’s love.

If you don’t get the message yet, let me tell you in simple words that a building means nothing but people mean everything.

I thank God that at one time there was group of people that saw a small church reaching a few for God’s glory. Now, my desire is to have a larger church reaching “many” because there are many Wanda’s in our community.”

## Relationships Matter Most

In the coming weeks Toys”R”Us is set to close its doors. There are many reasons they are closing, like poor fiscal management or lower national birth rate; however, there is one that stands above them all: buying goods online. In the past few years people have discovered it is cheaper, easier, and far more efficient to buy toys online. My wife and I do a large majority of our Christmas shopping online, it just makes sense for us. Along with commerce going online, many other things we do are done online, including our communication.

I still prefer a phone call instead of a text or email. I still like to talk to a live customer service rep instead of a live chat, but that kind of thinking is decreasing. A lot of young people do not like to talk on the phone, it is more efficient for them to text or chat. This is not a bad thing, it is the way they operate, it is the way our culture is going. The question that is plaguing my mind is what is the church’s place within the technological revolution? Will the modern church be like Toys”R”Us one day, out moated and ineffective?

We can already see many older style, traditional churches dying off, especially in the midwest and north. Even mega-churches that were on the cutting edge in the 2000’s have found themselves behind the times. Some churches have started online services and have seen success with that model. Others have branched out in a similar model where they have house churches that are connected online with a mega-church in another state. These innovations are great ways to use technology to spread the gospel, but even with new models they still rely on relationships. There will never be a replacement for relationships.

For a little over a year now I have had a life group in my home. I must confess I never understood the draw to home groups. Aren’t they just Sunday School classes in a home, I would say. But now my perspective has changed. The relationships that I have formed with people in my group are deep and amazing. And when I say amazing I don’t always mean it’s a bed of roses, sometimes we get on each other’s nerves, sometimes we offend each other, and we often have to show each other grace. We are literally living out the “one another” passages from the Bible. We are replicating the New Testament church through our relationship.

This is what being the church looks like and it is difficult to replicate through technology alone. Technology can help churches in many ways-- through communication, teaching, and connecting; however, the deeper ministry of the church happens through relationships. When we invite each other to experience life together, including the highs and the lows we are partaking in true biblical community. Phil 2:3-8 is a great example of how we are to operate in these biblical relationships, “*Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. 8 And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross.*”

Not only are we instructed on how to think about others and how to show them love but we are also given the example of Christ’s sacrifice. We are to show the same type of sacrificial love toward each other. These types of relationships are crucial to the church’s future and advancing the kingdom of God. There will never be a replacement for relationships, even as technology grows, relationships matter most. I challenge you to take time to invest in others, take time to listen to others and most of all take time to love others. It is messy and not always pleasant, but it is a huge blessing to live in community with other believer's.

Dear Church Family,

This April the Student Ministry is going to Highland Lakes for our Student Retreat! This is going to be a great time of fun activities, friendship building, and spiritual growth! If you are a parent or grandparent of a student grades 6-12, I highly suggest you encourage them to come with us to experience what God has in store. Why do I say this? Well obviously, it’s because I’m the youth pastor and am supposed to say this... right? Wrong. I highly encourage this because students have no where else to turn to get the biblical teaching, friendships, and wholesome fun that we will experience on things like this retreat.

The retreat’s theme is “Consumed” because we are going to take a look at what consumes us and what we are consuming in life. The world that we live in is not interested in helping us live our lives to the fullest for the Lord. It is interested in telling us how to live for ourselves. The world does not want you to be careful about the content that you take in through your eyes and ears. It wants you to simply pay more money for what goes into your eyes and ears, and it will make any content for which you are willing to pay. The world does not want you to follow the God who has full authority over us. It wants individuals to be the final authority over themselves; essentially mini-gods who claim sovereignty to rule their own lives as they see fit.

The world calls this autonomy, but God calls it idolatry. And the big question is: which do we consume, the teaching of the world or the teaching of the Lord? Seriously, which teaching goes into your eyes and ears the most? An even bigger question is: what consumes you, the Lord or yourself?

The world wants you to be so consumed with self that even doing good to others is about yourself. School, work, family, leisure, even church is about self when we are consumed with and consuming the world. So how do we fix this? First, we need to ask if we really want to fix it. Why would we want life to be about something other than ourselves? The only reason that ultimately makes sense is that we have been saved by Jesus and have the Holy Spirit living in us, transforming us into the image of Christ. That’s because without Christ in us, we are lost sinners. But with Christ in us, we are transformed lovers of God and neighbor. He gives us new hearts and those new hearts are God and others focused. If you have Christ, then this is true of you. So, if you have Christ, then you want this self-centered tendency fixed. And how do we fix it now that we know we want to? We consume the gospel of Christ throughout the word of God! We put into our eyes and ears the gospel. We remind ourselves of the truth that the world so desperately wants us to forget. When the world says, “did God really say?” We say, “yes, He did! Because I was reading what He said just a little while ago, and I am consumed by the gospel!”

Students need so much these days, but what they need most is to be consumed by the word of Christ, Christ-honoring friends, Christ-honoring families, and a Christ-honoring church. Colossians 3 spells this out to us, and I am super excited to talk with the students about what that really looks like for them at their stage in life, as well as when they grow older. So, if you’re a student, come join us as we get consumed with a passion for the gospel of Christ lived out!

# WORSHIP

This month, I want to leave you with an article encouraging family worship. As I was thinking through what worship would look like for our Church after Easter, as we move into a new season, I started asking the question, “What does worship look like outside of the Church walls?” This article encourages us all to see our time of worship as a time when we can also come together outside of Church, into our homes with our families. I hope this article encourages you to take time outside of our corporate worship gathering, to worship with your family.

**10 Reasons To Worship With Your Family** by Jason Helopoulos

“Most evangelical Christians are aware of the importance of secret and corporate worship, but fewer have even heard of family worship. What is family worship? It is pretty simple. Tonight, sit down with your family on the couch or at the dinner table. And then . . . pray together, read the Bible together, and sing a great hymn of the faith together. There are many reasons for doing family worship, but let us just mention a handful. Family worship: **1) Glorifies and Honors God** – This is the primary and essential reason. **2) Centers the Home** – Family worship has the wonderful effect of centering our homes upon Christ. **3) Encourages Christian Character** – The home may be the hardest place to live out our Christian lives. There is a reason that Paul addresses each member of the Christian family in the household passages of Ephesians 5-6 and Colossians 3. It is a sad reality that

we often manifest the character of Christ more consistently at church, in the workplace, and in the community than we do in our own homes. If there is somewhere that I must especially be on guard against sin, the flesh, and our adversary, it is at home. Casualness and familiarity is a ready playing field for sin. **4) Encourages Peace in the Home** – We are sinners living under the same roof in tight quarters. That is a recipe for disaster or at least pain! We know our family members, and we know them well. Family worship helps us confront our sin and understand its effect upon one another. For example, it is awfully hard for a father to lead his family in worship when he has just yelled at his wife. If he is going to lead his family before the throne of grace, he will first have to ask for forgiveness from his wife. And she will find that it is hard to worship unless she willingly forgives him. **5) Binds the Family Together** – In our fast-moving society there are few things that a family does together daily. Even eating a meal together these days seems like a feat. What if your family gathered together daily? And what if that gathering was for worship? It would become the most important and central aspect of its life. Your entire family will come to the realization that no matter what else we do or don’t do, the most important thing that marks us as a family is that we are a worshiping family submitted to Christ. And that bond is an eternal one that strengthens the family in all its other endeavors. **6) Provides Common Knowledge** – As the Scriptures are read together in family worship, the family grows in common knowledge. Conversations around the dinner table or in the car will change dramatically as you have a common knowledge from which to converse. **7) Trains Children for Corporate Worship** – Family worship provides the added benefit of training our children for corporate worship. As they sit and listen to the Word of God, hear prayers, and sing hymns these elements in corporate worship will take on a new meaning. The value of this cannot be overestimated. **8) Encourages our Children in Christ** – They will see that for mom and dad worship is not just something they do on Sunday mornings. It is something at the very core of their being, important enough that they center their home upon it. We are not raising children just to be moral and competent people, but worshipers of the triune God. **9) Reinforces Spiritual Headship** – Family worship reinforces the biblical framework of the family as it looks to the father (or the mother if she is single) as the spiritual leader of the home. As a father leads his children and wife before God’s throne nightly and disciples them in the things of Christ, they will increasingly look to him for spiritual leadership. This has the added benefit of reinforcing with the father/husband the spiritual mantle that is upon his shoulders. **10) Provides Systematic Discipleship** – As a pastor I often have individuals approach me with a question about how to minister to their children or spouse in a specific area. Usually they are concerned about a particular sin or struggle in their family member’s life. In this way we serve as firefighters rushing to extinguish this issue or that. At times this is needed, but it should not be our regular course of action. Systematic discipleship is a much better approach and is aided by family worship. Daily family worship will provide a strong foundation that is built upon hearing the Word daily, praying daily, and giving thanks daily. It takes time to build a strong house. It is an unsteady house that is the result of the carpenter running from shaky wall to shaky wall to hammer a nail in here or there.”

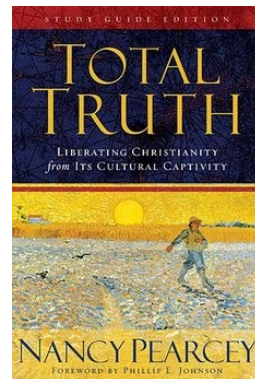

## Recommended Resource - *Total Truth* by Nancy Pearcey

Does God belong in the public arena of politics, business, law, and education? Or is religion a private matter only personally comforting but publicly irrelevant? In today's cultural etiquette, it is not considered polite to mix public and private, or sacred and secular.
