# PASTOR'S POINTS

Dear Church Family,

I pray that you all are doing well and enjoying your summer! This is such a great time to be with family and vacation together. I hope in the middle of all that summer offers you have had some time to rest and recharge your batteries as well. We all need time to relax, recharge, and rest. It is essential for balance in our lives. In the middle of all summer offers I have found God speaking to me strongly about one particular theme: Pride.

This theme has been resonating with me as we are making our way through the book of Matthew. I have seen this theme repeatedly in the lives of the Scribes and Pharisees. Repeatedly they approach Jesus through the lens of their pride. And the sad thing about this is that they do not recognize it. They see themselves as pleasing to God. But all the while they are blinded by their pride to the deep problem of sin that they have in their lives. I cannot stand that they do this time and again, but as I think about it, are we not all susceptible to the very same things in our lives if we are not careful. How easy is it for you to allow pride to well up in your life? How easy is it for us to see the faults of others all the while ignoring our own faults, or convincing ourselves that we do not have any faults? But pride left unchecked in our lives will bring destruction. It will tear down relationships, and it will sow discord between brothers and sisters in Christ quicker than anything. Listen to this quote from John Beveres' book, *The Bait of Satan: Living free from*

the trap of Offense...

"Pride keeps you from dealing with truth. It distorts your vision. You never change when you think everything is fine. Pride hardens your heart and dims the eyes of your understanding. It keeps you from the change of heart—repentance—that will set you free. (See 2 Timothy 2:24–26.) Pride causes you to view yourself as a victim. Your attitude becomes, "I was mistreated and misjudged; therefore, I am justified in my behavior." Because you believe you are innocent and falsely accused, you hold back forgiveness. Though your true heart condition is hidden from you, it is not hidden from God. Just because you were mistreated, you do not have permission to hold on to an offense. Two wrongs do not make a right!"

It is so easy for us to be blinded by our pride. It is so easy for us to justify sinful responses to others. We see this playing out so plainly in the life of the Scribes and Pharisees. But my prayer is that we not only see it in their lives, but that if it is in our lives that we detect it and deal with it in our lives as well. God has so much good in store for us in the future as a church family!! Let's live together in such a way that we are sensitive to what is going on in our hearts. Ask God to show you if any pride, or bitterness has taken root in your life. If so, repent of it to Him, and seek to be in right relationships with those around you. Let's have as our goal going forward together that we want love to be the fruit that we are producing in our lives, so we can love one another and so that our love can be a testimony to a watching world.

### A BLAST FROM THE PAST

A local hospital and local church have combined their efforts so people like Leila Evans can have the convenience of a home away from home.

Miss Evans, who lives in Owensboro, Ky., has been taking radiation therapy treatments on weekdays for five weeks at St. Mary's Medical Center.

She was dumbfounded when she learned she'd have to take the treatments every day.

"I didn't see how I could possibly make the daily round trip from Owensboro to Evansville by myself," she said. Officials at St. Mary's told Miss Evans about the old parsonage at Oakhill Baptist church. And in little time the church people had made arrangements for Miss Evans to occupy the facility so she wouldn't have to commute from Owensboro or rent a room in Evansville.

"This is just the grandest place I ever heard of. I brought my typewriter, my lamp, my niece's television and just moved right in," Miss Evans said.

Although Miss Evans normally transports herself to St. Mary's, the church people came through when driving conditions were hazardous recently.

Even though his son was having surgery that morning, church member Ronald Baker picked up Miss Evans in his four-wheel drive vehicle and took her to the hospital when snow and ice made driving hazardous.

Several people - including outpatients and patients' relatives - have occupied the house since it was ready in early August of last year.

About a year ago, Emma Meredith, a secretary in quality assurance at St. Mary's, and Micki Bennett, a registered nurse who is a discharge planner there, noticed that relatives of patients were sleeping in the hospital waiting rooms.

The two women conducted a survey which found that many of the relatives were from out of town. Unable to afford hotel accommodations but still desiring to be near seriously ill family members, the relatives had no alternative but to bed down for the night somewhere in the hospital.

Aside from their regular responsibilities, the women took up the challenge of doing something about the problem. They requested information from area churches concerning what type of temporary lodging might be available for patient's relatives or patients themselves who needed regular outpatient treatment.

Although the request was only for information, Oakhill Baptist responded with the offer of letting people stay in its old parsonage.

"We had on occasion used this space for accommodating visiting ministers," said the Rev. Roy Jones, pastor at the church. "It was just one of those things where they had a need, and we had the facilities."

Church people June Baker and Norman Baggett were instrumental in organizing the congregation, which took up the task of supplying clean linens, transporting patients to the hospital and cleaning the facilities on a weekly basis.

For St. Mary's, the Oakhill facility represents the first step in a project they hope will grow. The old parsonage has only one bedroom with a double bed available, so facilities are somewhat limited.

But Ms. Bennett and Ms. Meredith are keeping their eyes open for facilities which would enable them to expand the project. The house is also available to patients at Evansville's other hospitals.

### Good News Bible Club at Scott Elementary

We are sponsoring a Bible club at Scott Elementary this school year. April Sharp and I will be leading this mission opportunity in conjunction with Child Evangelism Fellowship. We are looking for volunteers that love kids to help us out. The commitment is once a week in the fall and spring. We are starting our club near the end of August and will be finished before Thanksgiving break. We are hoping to offer this club on Thursdays after school. This is a great opportunity to teach kids the Bible and share Jesus with them. We need about six volunteers that could help us in this ministry. Please let me or April know if you are interested.

### Oakhill Baptist Church Food Pantry

We are in need of some volunteers for our food pantry. Specifically, we need people that put together food boxes and take boxes out of the cars. There are lots of other ways to serve in the food pantry, as well. The best way to get involved is to come out one Saturday and see our operation. We are open twice a month on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturdays of each month. Volunteers need to arrive by 8:45 a.m. for prayer and announcements. We have a short wor-

ship service and usually start serving food by 10 a.m. and end at 12 p.m. We ask our volunteers to make a once-a-month commitment. We also need people that are musically talented to lead our worship services. Our food pantry is unique because we sit down with every client to try and minister to spiritual needs, as well as their physical needs. If you like talking to people, then care giving would be a great way for you to serve; whatever your gifts are we can use you at the food pantry. Let me know if you are interested in serving in this ministry.

### State Hospital Ministry

Our state hospital ministry is one of our oldest outreach ministries at Oakhill. Once a month our faithful volunteers minister to those in the hospital. They meet once a month on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Saturday at 9:45 a.m. at the hospital. Our volunteers visit with patients and build relationships to show the love of Christ. The hospital is also needing more volunteers for its Friend to Friend program. This program is to befriend a patient at the hospital and visit them monthly. They also appreciate correspondence with the patient. The commitment to that program is 1 year. Social parties for program participants are held the 2<sup>nd</sup> Thursday of each month from 2-3 p.m. Male sponsors are especially needed. Dear Church Family,

Recently I have been thinking about the fact that we call ourselves a church family. We are indeed a family built up of adopted sons and daughters of our Heavenly Father, who purchased us through Jesus Christ our Lord and elder brother. Similarly to how we all have family names that denote to whom we belong, our heavenly family name is *Christian*. It is our new last name. It was given to us when we were born again into this family of God. My true name is *Brian James Van Doren Christian*, and that declares that I belong to Christ our Savior, God our Father, and the Holy Spirit our helper. Everyone who has this same family name is my sibling... and that has a very significant meaning for how we live together.

Time spent together in fun fellowship and deep discipleship is exactly what a healthy family needs. That is what the student ministry has been focusing on this summer. We have spent much of our time together simply having fun and enjoying a few laughs. But we have also been focusing intentionally on our relationships with Christ and how that ought to impact how we relate to one another. Those last two sentences are not mutually exclusive, however. Often we have had fun fellowship and intentional discipleship at the same time! The reason this is so important is because it is in these times that the gospel is worked out in our lives. Students know that "Jesus" is the right answer in Sunday School. But they won't see how Jesus actually guides their thoughts and actions when interpersonal drama creeps in unless they are experiencing regular Christian fellowship and intentional discipleship. They need to spend time with their heavenly family and be committed to seeing the gospel that unites us together worked out in their relationships. We all need this. And we need to lead the younger generation to strive for this. The question is, will we be committed to our heavenly family, or will we be committed to ourselves?

Fall is quickly approaching, and I know we're all ready for some cooler air. It's been an exciting season of ministry here at Oakhill, and we are excited to see what God is going to do as we press forward into the future. This month I want to ask a question and encourage you to ponder with it: How do you worship in hard times? In hard times and hard seasons of life, do you inch closer to God, or do you lean further away from God? I think we can all agree that it's easy to worship when things are going well. But when things aren't going well, sometimes our worship of God is more absent from our lives than present. I want to encourage us all to remain faithful in our worship, in every season, just as God remains faithful to us at all times.

Psalms 46:1-3 says, "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea." The reality is that there are only two times in our lives when we should worship God - when we feel like it, and when we don't. What we need to understand is that even in the hardest of times, God is just as faithful as He is in the good times. He's always the same God, never changing. So many times we wrestle with the idea that be-

cause we have fallen on hard times, God's love for us has altered, or we start to think that He somehow has changed. But the reality is that He has not changed, but we have changed. Our hearts have changed. Our hearts have become cold and distant because our lives haven't gone exactly how we planned for them to go. We have to trust that God's plans for us are far better than the plans we can make on our own. God doesn't lead us to the fire, He leads us through the fire.

So this week, be encouraged to worship God even in the hard times. Don't hide from God. If you're sad, bring your feelings to Him in prayer. If you're angry, tell Him. If you're lonely, tell Him. Whatever your trials may be, bring them before God, as He already knows them very well. He is our Perfect Creator, and our Good Father. He knows you and He loves you. We can be comforted in the middle of a storm, because we know the maker of the storm, and He knows us. ## What is Biblical Hope?

We use the word hope in a variety of ways. Sometimes it connotes a wish about something over which we have no control at all. We say, "I sure hope the train comes soon," or, "I hope it doesn't rain on the day of the picnic." These are wishes for things, but we wouldn't bank on them. The word hope also depicts what we think should happen. We say, "I hope he will choose to be honest this time," or, "I hope the judge brings down a guilty verdict." Here hope reveals an internal sense of morality or justice. We also use hope in a motivational sense. We say, "I did this in the hope that it would pay off in the end," or, "I got married in the hope that he would treat me in marriage the way he treated me in courtship." All of this is to say that because the word hope is used in a variety of ways, it is important for us to understand how this word is used in Scripture or in its gospel sense. Biblical hope is foundationally more than a faint wish for something.

Biblical hope is deeper than moral expectation, although it includes that. Biblical hope is more than a motivation for a choice or action, although it is that as well. So what is biblical hope? It is a *confident expectation of a guaranteed result that changes the way you live*. Let's pull this definition apart.

First, biblical hope is *confident*. It is confident because it is not based on your wisdom, faithfulness, or power, but on the awesome power, love, faithfulness, grace, patience, and wisdom of God. Because God is who he is and will never, ever change, hope in him is hope well placed and secure.


Hope is also *an expectation of a guaranteed result*. It is being sure that God will do all that he has planned and promised to do. You see, his promises are only as good as the extent of his rule, but since he rules everything everywhere, I know that resting in the promises of his grace will never leave me empty and embarrassed. I may not understand what is happening and I may not know what is coming around the corner, but I know that God does and that he controls it all. So even when I am confused, I can have hope, because my hope does not rest on my understanding, but on God's goodness and his rule.

Finally, true hope *changes the way you live*. When you have hope that is guaranteed, you live with confidence and courage that you would otherwise not have. That confidence and courage cause you to make choices of faith that would seem foolish to someone who does not have your hope. If you're God's child, you never have to live hopelessly, because hope has invaded your life by grace, and his name is Jesus!

### Recommended Resource— *God Is* by Mark Jones

God has revealed many things about himself in his Word. But God's manifold attributes shine most clearly in his Son, Jesus Christ, who came to reveal his Father. Through Christ's saving work on the cross, we are able to know and worship God rightly.

This book aims to help us study and understand the attributes of God so that we delight in and love him with all our heart, soul, strength, and mind. Each chapter explains one attribute, shows how it is most clearly manifested in Christ, and provides practical application for the Christian
