For Christians in particular, the stakes are even higher for cultivating holy curiosity and the mindset of a lifelong learner. Teaching and learning are at the very heart of our faith. To be a "disciple" means to be a "learner." Our Master is the consummate teacher, and the central task of his under shepherds in the local church is teaching (<u>Titus 1:9</u>; <u>1 Timothy 3:2</u>; <u>5:17</u>; <u>Hebrews 13:7</u>; <u>Matthew 28:20</u>). God designed the church to be a community of lifelong learners under the earthly guidance of leaders who are teachers at heart.

The Christian faith is not a finite course of study for the front-end of adulthood. Our mindset shouldn't be to first do our learning and then spend the rest of our lives drawing from that original deposit of knowledge. Rather, ongoing health in the Christian life is inextricably linked to ongoing learning."



WOMEN ON MISSION

In a recent conversation with Martha Boultinghouse and her daughter Bonnie Beckham, they shared memories of the early days of Oakhill. Their family had attended the Rescue Mission downtown for a number of years when Maurice noted that they passed a Baptist Church every Sunday on their way into town. He thought they could attend a church closer to home that would provide more for their children. In 1961 they began attending Oakhill. Cindy was 9, Bonnie was 8, and Judy was 7.

Oakhill met in a 3 car garage and small residence at the present location. When they moved into a new building in 1965, Martha helped organize the nursery and kitchen. They had to start from scratch as far as furnishings were concerned. Not a lot of money was available to them. Dishes were purchased from a dime store at Lawndale (Kresge or Woolworth). The ladies chipped in to make the purchase. Economy Market had a deal giving silverware when you purchased groceries. Port-a-cribs were bought for \$10.00 each. Martha served in the nursery from 1964 to 1979. Bonnie has served since she was in her 20's. Her husband Larry works with her. Martha recalled that in the early days the members took turns cleaning the church. Nothing was hired out that could be done by members or the pastor. Rev Bill Carter did the weekly bulletin, cleaned snowy drives and walks, mowed grass, whatever needed to be done.

When the church voted to build, the Boultinghouse family was 1 of 7 who put their homes up as collateral. We are blessed to have charter members Martha Boultinghouse and Bonnie Beckham still at Oakhill. We appreciate their years of service and faithfulness. They have touched and continue to touch many lives.

Do you ever find yourself surprised by the swift justice of God? Hopefully you have been taking the journey through the scriptures with the rest of the church. If so, you are currently reading through 1 Samuel and Acts; both books have examples of swift justice. We have read about how Saul's line was cut off for his disobedience in offering a sacrifice himself instead of waiting for Samuel. In Acts we have seen how Ananias and Sapphira dropped dead after lying about the price of land they sold. Both examples, and many more in the Bible, show that God's justice can sometimes be swift. I remember when I first read these stories I was troubled by them. Why would God be so cruel to these people? I remember having similar thoughts as the Israelites were commanded to slaughter the Canaanites or when God sent poisonous serpents through the Israelites' camp as a punishment. How can you be so mean, God?

Surprised by Justice?

Often our view of God is skewed by the expectation of God being merciful in all things. We want on-demand mercy. We not only expect it, we think we deserve it. What's wrong with that kind of thinking? It assumes we have done something to earn God's mercy and it also doesn't take into account God's true character. In actuality we have done the opposite-- every sin is a rebellion to God and brings us closer to receiving God's justice.

In R.C. Sproul's book The Holiness of God he paraphrases a quote by Hans Kung, a Roman Catholic theologian, "the most mysterious aspect of the mystery of sin is not that the sinner

deserves to die, but rather that the sinner in the average situation continues to exist." Did you notice how he took our regular way of thinking that we deserve God's mercy and flipped it around? He wonders why we don't get God's justice, why do we continue to live in spite of our sinfulness?

Sproul says about this subject, "[God] is indeed long-suffering, patient, and slow to anger. In fact He is so slow to anger that when His anger does erupt, we are shocked and offended by it. We forget rather quickly that God's patience is designed to lead us to repentance, to give us time to be redeemed. Instead of taking advantage of this patience by coming humbly to Him for forgiveness, we use this grace as an opportunity to become more bold in our sin. We delude ourselves into thinking that either God doesn't care about it, or that He is powerless to punish us. The supreme folly is that we think we will get away with our revolt."

Are we more surprised by justice when we should be surprised by mercy? We should be shocked that a holy God wants to redeem us and used His own son to accomplish this task. We should be appalled that we have another breath, considering the rebellion that has formed in our hearts. This is why we must throw ourselves at the mercy of God delivered through the gospel of Jesus Christ. The Christian should thank God every day that God has made us righteous by the sacrifice of Christ, that he is now in Christ, and adopted into the family of God. This is the true reality of both justice and mercy in our lives—God showing His great mercy by not giving us the swift justice that we are owed so we can come to Christ and receive the fullness of God in Jesus Christ.

We must not forget this truth and we must not get complacent in our faith. This truth should drive us to share the gospel and tell everyone about Jesus. Peter reminds us of this very truth in 2 Peter 3:9-10, "The Lord is not slow to fulfill his promise as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing that any should perish, but that all should reach repentance. But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a roar, and the heavenly bodies will be burned up and dissolved, and the earth and the works that are done on it will be exposed."

There will be a day of ultimate justice and we must not forget that, but until then we must not be surprised by God's swift justice, rather let's be thankful for His great mercy!

The Importance of Good Communication

The power of good communication is often undervalued and underestimated. We can assume that people already know what we think they should, we think that its not necessary to communicate in advance, or we think that we have communicated adequately when in reality we haven't. Everyone has experience the consequences of bad communication at some point, but what does the Bible have to say about our communication?

The Bible says that our words are powerful (Prov. 18:21; James 3:1-8), are valuable (Prov. 20:15; 25:11-14), and reflect our heart (Prov. 6:12; Matt. 12:34). It also gives instructions on how we are to communicate such as: set a guard over your lips (Ps. 141:3), your lips should offer up a sacrifice of praise (Heb. 13:15), speak encouragingly (Eph. 4:29), and bridle your tongue (James 1:26).

In Ephesians 4:25-32, Paul describes for his readers the ways that we should communicate with others around us. We can summarize these insights into four "rules" for communication. First, be honest (Eph. 4:25). We must speak everyday in order to be a functional part of society, but when we speak it must be truthful. We should avoid exaggeration, evasion, and half-truths, which are all types of falsehood that Paul assumes believers have put away. Earlier in this chapter (4:15), Paul says that when we speak truth it should be done lovingly. We should be concerned with what we say, how we say it, how much we say, and when we say it.

Second, keep current (Eph. 4:26-27). Solve each day's problems quickly. When we fail to do this it: opens the way for resentment, hatred, and bitterness to take root; distorts previous problems; sets the stage for spiritual discouragement; and among married couples, it endangers sexual and relational intimacy that is good and necessary. As we strive to resolve current conflict we must ask: Do I have all the facts right? (Prov. 18:13), What is my reason for bringing this up? (Prov. 27:6), Have I dealt with my responsibility? (Matt. 7:1-5), Am I being loving? (Eph. 4:15), Is it timely (Prov. 15:23), and Have I asked the Lord for understanding? (Prov. 3:5)


Third, attack problems, not people (Eph. 4:29-30). Avoid harmful, corrupting words that tear down, bypass the conflict, and that grieve the Holy Spirit. Instead, use edifying words that build up, that deal with what the person says or does, and that help reach a solution. When there is relational discord, the goal should be restoration, not merely confrontation.

Fourth, act, don't react (Eph. 4:31-32). In verse 31 Paul describes many reactions that must be put off completely such as: bitterness (the inability to treat someone as if they never hurt you), wrath (flaring outbursts of rage), anger (settled indignation of hostility that frequently seeks revenge), clamor (harsh contention and strife, public quarreling, brawling), slander (speech that injures, abusive speech), and malice (the desire to harm others or to see others suffer). In verse 32, Paul describe attitudes and actions we must put on to replace these reactions such as: kindness (benevolent, helpful, courteous), tenderhearted (compassionate, sympathetic), and forgiveness (to pass over an offense and to free the offender from the consequences of it—"just as God in Christ forgave you").

Recommended Resource— Conscience by Andrew Naselli & J.D. Crowley

What do you do when you disagree with other Christians? How do you determine which convictions are negotiable and which are not? How do you get along with people who have different personal standards?

All of these questions have to do with the conscience. Yet there is hardly a more neglected topic among Christians. In this much needed book, the authors explore all thirty passages that deal with the conscience in the New Testament, showing how your conscience impacts virtually every area of your life, ministry, and missions. As you come to see your conscience as a gift from God and learn how to calibrate it under the Lordship of Christ, you will not only experience the freedom of a clear conscience but also discover how to lovingly interact with those who hold different convictions.
